Memorials and Sacred Stones

In the Old Testament sacredness was often attached to an act of divine power or a place of sacred activity. Such power and places were to bring remembrance the event and God's involvement in it. These events brought the worshiper into a favorable commemoration and devotion toward God. Often under the Old Testament the worshiper offered a sacrifice (Lev 2:2, 9; 16; 5:12; 24:7). The places were marked with a monolith, rock or stones. Such places became boundaries or crossroads which took on a sacred character. Jacob raised such a monolith to remember a covenant which he and Laban, his father-in-law, made concerning their being brethren (Gen 31:43-55). They erected it at Mizpah saying, "Jehovah watch between me and thee, when we are absent one from another. If thou shalt afflict my daughters, and if thou shalt take wives besides my daughters, no man is with us, to see, God is witness betwixt me and thee". The heap or pillar was set between them as a witness that neither would pass over the boundary line to do harm. With further solemnity they said, "...the God of Abraham, and the God of Nahor, the God of their father, judge betwixt us. And Jacob swore by the fear of his father Isaac. And Jacob offered a sacrifice in the mountain, and called his brethren to eat bread: and they did eat bread, and tarried all night in the mountain. And early in the morning Laban rose up, and kissed his sons and daughters, and blessed them: and Laban departed". Jacob saw a vision of a ladder reaching to heaven and the angels of Jehovah ascending and descending and "behold Jehovah stood above it, and said, I am Jehovah, the God of Abraham thy father, and the God of Isaac: the land whereon thou liest, to thee will I give it and to thy seed; and thy seed shall be as the dust of the earth, and thou shalt spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north, and to the south; in thee and in they seed shall all the families of the earth be blessed" (Gen 28:10-17). Jacob took the stone from under his head setting up a pillar in memorial of this event. He vowed saying, "If God will be with me, and will keep me in this way that I go, and will give me bread to eat, and raiment to put on, so that I come again to my father's house in peace. and Jehovah will be my God, then this stone, which I have set up for a pillar, shall be God's house: and all that thou shalt give me I will surely give the tenth unto thee" (Gen 28;18-22).

When Rachel died Israel raised a stone upon her grave and called it "Rachel's Stone" (Gen 35:20). This venerated the life and love of this great woman. Joshua raised stones as an altar in the Jordon River and beyond it near Jericho (Josh 3). He set up twelve stones in Gilgal according to the tribes of Israel (Josh 4). Gideon offered a sacrifice of a kid to Jehovah, unleavened bread and meal with a broth from a pot upon a rock near an oak tree (Judges 6). Often Israel had places of sacredness where memorial pillars were employed to remind them. They never erected any type of statue or image of a person, as an Asherah. Yet there was clear evidence of deity being honored by these memorials. Twelve pillars at Sinai commemorated the covenant (Ex 24:4). Moses commanded a monolith at Mt. Ebal with the words of the law incised

in the plaster overlay (Deut 27:2). Saul built a monument of victory and the great stone altar served as a memorial (1 Sam 15:12, 33). Absalom raised a pillar to memorialize himself (2 Sam 18:18). Many honored the dead with permanent and temporary monoliths (1 Macc 12:7). Thus the memorial of graves became a custom. Jehu destroyed the prohibited pillars to Baal (Deut 16L22; 2 Kg 10:26, 27). The cases of sacred stones is seen in many Bible passages (Josh 15:6; 18:17; 24:26, 27; 1 Sam 20:19; 2 Sam 20:8).

The New Testament speaks of memorials as well. Christ was in Bethany at the home of Simon, the leper, reclining at a table and there came a woman with a sealed alabaster cruse (Mk 14:3-9: 16:3-; Lk 7;37-39; Matt 26:6-13; Jn 12:1-8). This semitransparent vessel was so designed that the neck of it had to be broken before the contents could be dispensed. This ointment left no oily stain but evaporated into the loveliest of odors like a costly perfume. It was called "nard" or "spikenard", taken from a variety of the Valerian family, of which roots furnished a fragrant essence. Thus, part of the plant had to die to furnish this fragrance. John alone gives the woman's name, Mary the sister of Martha (Jn 12:3). Of interest, the books of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John were written many years after the death of Christ and special events became a unique part of biblical history. The disciples were indignant over what they considered a wasteful use of this nard. Judas heads the list of those who complained. They wanted it to be given to the poor and criticized Mary's labor of love. Jesus stopped them by placing two facts before them. They always had the poor with them and He was going to die. Yet Jesus is not thinking of these only. He wants them to know that she had done all she could do. She had undertaken in advance the preparation for His death and burial. Thus throughout the generations of those who read the Bible her deed would be as a memorial. It does not surprise Bible readers today that Mary had her mind on sacred things. The disciples were more engaged in the temporal matters. In this providential manner she had intuitively undertook to bless the Lord in such a unique manner. Jesus announced that wherever the Gospel was preached her name would be spoken of as a memorial of one woman's love for the Son of God (Mk 14:9; Mat 26:13).
