

SUSPICIOUS MINDS

When we **assume**, we are *presuming* a thing to be true without proof. Assuming a thing to be true about another means we are *supposing* the case to be true without proof, making us guilty of a *prejudgment* before hearing all the evidence. If such a thing is not allowed in court, then why would we even allow it to occur in our own lives?

A universal principle is that we are not to bear false witness (Exodus 20:16). The wise Solomon says, "Be not a witness against your neighbor without cause, and do not deceive with your lips" (Proverbs 24:28). Moses wrote, "A single witness shall not suffice against a person for any crime or for any wrong in connection with any offense that he has committed. Only on the evidence of two witnesses or of three witnesses shall a charge be established" (Deuteronomy 19:15).

Where do our assumptions come from? They typically come from our *feelings*. Sometimes we might say, "Well, I feel Jill is wrong." Our personal judgment, therefore, is based upon how we *feel*. But, brethren, how one *feels* does not make a thing so. Our *feelings* are based on emotions and our *feelings* and *emotions* are not **facts**. Emotions are associated with the heart, and it is NOT a good thing to follow one's heart especially when we find ourselves devoid of facts and shrouded in ignorance. Concerning the heart, the prophet Jeremiah wrote: "**The heart is deceitful above all things, And desperately wicked; Who can know it? I, the LORD, search the heart, I test the mind, Even to give every man according to his ways, According to the fruit of his doings" (Jeremiah 7:9-10). Be careful when you think you need to follow your heart.**

As Christians we are to have wisdom in making judgments on a person or situation. Failing to be wise, especially in truth, is either highly prideful as if we know all things, or highly wicked as if we don't care about truth. If we assume based on facts, then we are not assuming, we are, instead, making an educated judgment based on proof or evidence. We cannot determine something to be true about someone based purely on our feelings, but only upon facts.

Assuming is not a fruit of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22), and it is certainly not the Golden Rule of Matthew 7:12. The apostle Paul tells us that love, "thinks no evil, does not rejoice in iniquity but rejoices in the truth; bears all things, bears all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails" (1 Corinthians 13:5-7). Love can fail when it fails to do the above things, one of which is that love is to believe all things. That does not mean we should gullible, but rather we are to think the best of people until evidence (facts) prove otherwise. That is why we rejoice in the truth, because Christians are about seeking and knowing truth, rather than making judgments based upon hearsay or speculation.

The apostle Paul speaks about "evil suspicions" (1 Timothy 6:4). The Greek word, *huponoia*, means, *suspicion*, *suppose*, *suspect*, *surmise*, *and supposition*, and all these words are akin to assume, which means *to suppose*. When we make a judgment about someone, without facts, we are guilty of assuming, that is we have *suspicious minds*.

I deal with many preachers in different countries by helping them to help others. Many preachers preach to more than one or two congregations per Sunday. They deal with the poorest of the poor, such as the widows and orphans. There are some here at Belt Line who donates \$50 to \$100 monthly or quarterly to send to Africa. I can send it free to preacher friends in Africa who are thrilled to go buy food and distribute it properly and they will email back reports and pictures of the event. I also have verification from trusted Americans in the area that can substantiate their action. I notify you of this opportunity to participate, if you desire and have some funds to help. You can talk to me about it or just write a check to Church of Christ and give it to me. The funds go through the church office.
